- discuss elements of ancient Greek culture.



We will complete the first half of the grammar of classical Greek. We will cover Shelmerdine Chapters 1-13, with tests covering chapters 1-5, 6-9, and 10-13. Quizzes will be announced and used to assess memorization of charts. Tests will have one section on this also, along with sections on grammar and translation. Classical Greek differs from New Testament *Koinê* (common) Greek in a few ways, but they are close, and we will read some selections from the Bible in 1002, along with selections from Herodotus and other authors. Classical Greek was also not really a single language. There are some differences of dialect, and we will be learning the rules of Attic (Athenian) Greek from the late 5th-early 4th c., as found in the styles of Herodotus and Plato. Homer's dialect is often associated with his reputed home and the center of a Homeric community of poets on the island of Chios and thus sometimes called 'Old Ionic'. Ionic is pretty close to Attic Greek, but Chios is adjacent to the Aeolic region which has notable differences, yet with only a four pages of notes on the grammatical variations we will be able to read *Iliad* or *Odyssey* in GRK 2004.
