

Howdy All!

I hope this message finds you well. Here are the details for the Final Exam and the Assessment Exam for OMGT3223.

Final Exam Instructions:

1. Per the course syllabus, we have 10% of the grade in the class left: 5% for the Final Exam and 5% for the Assessment Exam.
2. For the Final Exam, I am assigning 1/2 of that 5% (i.e., 2.5%) to your Exams. Therefore, the Exams will now be weighted 62.5%% instead of 60%.
3. Your portion of the Final Exam is to decide where you want the other 1/2 of the 5% (i.e., 2.5%) to be assigned. You can choose homework, exams, or quizzes. For example, if you choose to assign the weight to your quizzes, then quizzes will be weighted 6.25% instead of 4%.
4. A good decision rule is to assign the weight to the area that you did the best on (i.e., it is better to weight A's more than C's or D's).
5. You must post your answer to Canvas in the Final Exam assignment area by 12 midnight on Monday May 4th or you lose the weight. A short phrase posted in Canvas such as "I would like my Final Exam weight to be applied to my quizzes" is just what I am looking for.

There is some decision making under uncertainty here. As y'all have experienced, that area is one objective of this course based around becoming a more efficient and effective decision maker.

Assessment Exam Instructions:

As for the Assessment Exam, it will be posted by Thursday April 30th within Canvas.

It is a multiple-choice exam with ten questions. The exam will time out after 30 minutes so allot yourself 20-25 minutes to take the exam and 5-10 minutes to check your answers before submitting.

You may take the exam only once so prepare yourself ahead of time. I have posted a review sheet for the Assessment Exam on the course website. I suggest you peruse that review sheet before taking the online exam. You are on your honor to complete this exam with closed book and notes and no collaboration with outside entities or students.

The assessment exam is due by Midnight Monday May 4th.
